What is Title IX?

Title IX is a federal civil rights law.

Title IX prohibits/forbids discrimination on the basis of sex in schools.

What locations does the Title IX law influence?

Recent Update to Title IX

Most recently in April 2024, The U.S. Department of Education amended the original Title IX Education Amendment law of 1972.

Recent directives, such as Executive Orders 13988 and 14021, reinforce Title IX's protections against discrimination based on gender identity, sexual orientation, and sex.

Frequency of Sexual Abuse

In Connecticut, 14% of residents report that they have personally experienced childhood sexual assault.

15.5% of high school females, 7.5% of high school males have been forced to have sex with someone.

How can you report a potential Title IX violation?

In person reporting to your title ix coordinator or any other school administrator (principal or vice principal)

Written complaints via e-mail or mail.

Discussing with a trusted adult who can pass this information to the necessary party.

Online reporting (if your school has an online reporting system)

Telephone reporting

Anonymous reporting

What is a Title IX Coordinator?

School districts that receive federal funds must designate an employee to oversee Title IX requirements, act as a point-of-contact for sexually related complaints and coordinate these investigations. This individual is known as the Title IX coordinator. Connecticut law requires each public school district to have at least one Title IX Coordinator


